Part 2, Section 7: The Project Manager's Report.

A year ago, at the end of the last financial year and when the last Annual Review took place, I was in sunny Australia. Oh, yeah! I remained out of England until June. I returned to work on the 27th of that month. I remember it clearly. I had no house and no money – but I did have a job at The Wire. I knew in my heart that I had to return from Australia to Littlehampton. So, return to Littlehampton I did.

Within 6 weeks Vanessa Brent, Abi Williams and Julie Hayes had all left. Vanessa emigrated to Canada and left a huge gap in our team. Abi continued her work in Angmering Secondary School (and it's feeder schools) but no longer as a part of The Wire Project. Julie's part time Finance role developed into a full time vacancy – and Andrew MacKinnon filled this position.

The periods of transition, staff changes and feelings of vulnerability have continued ever since. Our new Deputy Project Manager (Vanessa's replacement) lasted two weeks. Abi's replacement (for her role working with the Young Parents) last three days.

As we approached the end of 2005, the team all knew that it was time for Paul Sanderson and The Wire Project to release each other and for Paul to move on to bigger and better things for Spurgeon's Child Care and the Salvation Army. I applied for the role as Project Manager. I didn't get the job. Then I did get the job. I am pleased to announce that I am still here.

In February 2006 Gemma had two days of her contract left. Her redundancy cheque was in the post. With 48 hours to spare, funding for her role arrived and her contract currently keeps her with us until August 2006. In 2005/06 139 different volunteers put in a total of 6978 hours – over 2800 of these volunteer hours were put in during the Festival of Wick. Gemma recruits, trains and supports our volunteers. She is integral to this project and I wanted to mention her especially here for being so hard working and faithful when funding meant she had to cut down to 2 days a week.

On March 31st our administrator Jo left us, as funding for her position ceased. On the same day the After School Study Club and both our Breakfast Clubs closed. This was a terribly sad day for us all. However, on a happier note, we received money to continue Young Parents, Art Attack and Blaze for another year.

We continue to remain in a financially vulnerable position. Gemma (August), Andrew (October), Bex (December) and myself (October) will cease to work for the Wire in 2006 unless further funding is secured.

However, I believe that since Andrew arrived last summer he brought (financially speaking) knowledge, perfectionism and experience. I believe he has 'pulled out the weeds, turned the soil over and prepared the ground' for 2006/07. With the closure of our clubs and the seven staff redundancies made in March 2006, I liken this to the Wire 'being pruned and cut back'. My belief and prayer is that soon our core costs will be secure, God will water our 'Wire plant' and so our

good soil, our solid foundations and with our pruning we'll be ready to bloom and blossom again in ways we never imagined.

Right now we do what we can and we do it well.

There are a few significant relationships with other agencies that have been very important to us. We are incredibly grateful to all our funders and supporters because without them this project would not exist. However, I would like to highlight specifically Arun Community Church and SureStart. Jon, Bex, Clare, Al, Louisa and Paul have all been based at the Wickbourne Centre during 2005/06 and our unity with these two organisations has been essential. Our friendship with Linda Rowlinson at Littlehampton Baptist Church has been key.

Our positive relationship with Head teacher David Vickers at Flora McDonald Junior School seems to get better each year. His understanding, passion, commitment and generosity is a huge lift to us all. He is a fine specimen of an exemplary human being.

The next section, as part of my report, has photos of our team. They are dedicated, passionate, amazing people who support and work hard in our community that we call Littlehampton. We would be nothing without them and I wanted to honour them especially in this report. Particularly those who, whether through funding issues or because of other circumstances, have had to move on. Thank you.

I am in my fourth month as Project Manager. I would like to thank Sandra Rome, Phil Rolfe, Jim Andrews, Marina McEwan, Tracie Larkins and all at Spurgeon's Head Office for their guidance, patience and support with myself and Andrew through our transitions. I would like to 'high five' Paul Sanderson for his friendship and encouragement. I would like to buy a drink for Hilary Spencer, Rosie Parfitt, Sim Dendy and Linda Rowlinson who sit on the 'Underwires' Steering Group. And finally I would like to take my wife Becky away for a week in the sun next month for loving me more than ever since January 03rd 2006 when my life as the Wire's Project Manager began.

With all these changes our aim has still remained to work alongside existing community projects and develop new initiatives for the children, young people and families of Wick, Littlehampton. Although numerically we are supporting less individuals than we were 12 months ago due to the funding issues and staff turnover (which has been full explained in this Review), our focus to serve this community has not been compromised. Our intention is to commit unswervingly to make a positive difference to the lives of children, young people and families in Littlehampton.

Part 2, Section 8: Regional Manager's Comments.

Well what a year! As you will have read, I finally let go of the reigns of the WIRE in January of this year into the amazing hands of Mark Yates.

In his short time as Project Manager Mark has handled more changes that I had to do in 10 years. Mark has risen to the challenge incredibly. His drive and motivation along side his sense of humour and passion to see change take place have meant that the changes have happened and the work still goes on.

We have over the last year asked many of our partners and funders is there a need for the WIRE. The encouragement we have received has been inspiring and has helped us through these difficult times. Times of great government initiative like Every Child Matters, Extended Schools, "respect" and the inclusion agenda and yet at the same time a reduction and drying up of funding opportunities for voluntary organisations like the WIRE working in deprived areas to continue to respond to the needs.

I would like to summarise my feelings by finishing my report with an e-mail I wrote 31st March 2006:

It's been an emotional day at the WIRE project and I wanted to share my thoughts and feelings with you. The reason I write to you is because you have at some stage in my journey with the WIRE been a great support to me personally or practically or professionally. As you can see from the list of names above there have been a lot of you!

My role changed at Christmas to Line Manage the new WIRE project Manager Mark Yates and with the rest of my time to develop new community projects in other areas based on the WIRE success. However something as special as the WIRE is always hard to let go totally so this morning I rose early to visit the two breakfast clubs we run, for the last time.

The last time because in this time of extended schools and every child matters and community cohesion and capacity building the WIRE was unable to raise the funds in time to keep the clubs open for another year.

Its ironic that in the most deprived wards in West Sussex the activity that makes the most difference to the most hard to reach and "poorest" kids is the one that today the WIRE had to shut down.

This morning we played football and games, sat and ate cereals fruit, toast and special today pancakes! We chatted about life, football the weekend. We laughed as I slipped in the playground as I kicked the ball over the fence. Normal fun great start to the day stuff that after Easter these 40 kids will not have. Some of the kids had brought in cards and presents to the 4 staff members who today are made redundant, others don't understand. The volunteers (7 across the 2 clubs) included one teenager Georgina aged 17. She was apart of the first breakfast club when it launched 6 and a half years ago. It has provided countless free breakfast, words of encouragement and advice. Hundreds of opportunities to volunteer and learn new skills. It has taught healthy living, it has taught social skills, it had filled stomachs and therefore brains with a

healthy quality and quantity to get them through the school day. It has been to some, the start to the day that makes the day. It will be missed.

Those of you who know me well will understand how walking away from the clubs this morning I shed a tear or two. Tears of anger that we failed to get the funding. Tears of frustration that the WIRE and the team are responding to the needs, real genuine needs, and yet somehow these two small clubs with their big impact are now just a memory. Tears that drive me and my work to push on and continue to make the difference all the agencies and funders, partners and most importantly the community say we do.

Alongside that our team administrator Jo Hibberd of 2 years is made redundant today. Again funding not found for this background post that makes the exciting stuff work.

We have deferred the closure of our after school Study Club as a funder has given positive vibes' but will only be able to tell us at the end of April.

My wife is amazing and is also a keen gardener and I hate it when she prunes the plants and the trees in the garden. But every time she tells me it's vital for their growth and health.

Mark Yates and I are holding onto that at the moment. I still hate it when she prunes and I hate this pruning that the WIRE is going through now. I hate it because the kids and the parents and volunteers are missing out on opportunities. We know because we have been doing the work for nearly 10 years and have all the evidence on paper, in photographs and in the lives of changed children and young people and adults with hope and a community with a heartbeat again.

Thanks for making time to read my emotions of today. The WIRE is fighting for justice for this community. I in my new role and because of the WIRE I am fighting for opportunities for other deprived areas. Please keep us in your thoughts and I look forward to communicating more on the present and the future.

The WIRE is wanted, needed and ready to respond to the challenges ahead. I aim to continue to support Mark and his team in the big decisions and choices that need to be made in the weeks and months ahead.

Comments from Hilary Spencer, Chair of the 'Underwire' Management Committee / Steering Group.

The Underwire Group continues to support and champion the work of the Wire and its activities in the Littlehampton area, however I feel we have reflected growing concern as to the long term viability of The Wire. The activities continue to offer a wide range of well supported and valued services but despite over 3 years of pushing for the strengthening of the Core organisation, it is now in the position which we all feared.

A number of factors appear to have contributed to this, most of which were the result of the Wires commitment to the Community and desire to focus efforts into the delivery of services rather than 'bureaucracy'. This should not diminish the efforts of Vanessa , Andrew and Jo, but certainly from a personal perspective it felt like trying to turn an oil tanker round, and time scales are against us. I believe there is an understanding now that the Core work needs to be resourced, supported and valued by the whole team if the Wire is to survive, but I worry that there is continued temptation to grab pots of money to deliver projects which cannot be sustained in the longer term.

A further complication within West Sussex arises where funders are beginning to get to grips with 'full cost recovery' for organisations but see the 20% contribution to Spurgeon's as addressing this issue, it makes it very difficult to increase budgets sufficiently to cover both Spurgeon's and The Wire's core costs. My biggest regret over the past year is the negative impact that the uncertainty has had on the staff team, whose loyalty and commitment is second to none. I hope that the Underwire Group will be able to contribute to the development of a forward / business plan that secures the future and that we can minimise the negative impact on the services, staff and the community in the meantime.

Part 2, Section 10: Case Examples.

Please insert two case examples highlighting the work the project has undertaken.

Case 1: "Blaze!"

In April 2005 we secured over six thousands pounds from the Sussex Police and the Arun Crime and Disorder partnership to continue working with twelve teenage lads that we had spent 6 months supporting. These lads were specifically chosen by us because of their high number of school inclusions, their anti social behaviour and therefore their 'close' relationship with the Littlehampton police force.

Our aims for 'Blaze' are:

- 1) To visit the targeted group once a week in school for One 2 One support.
- 2) To speak to the parent / carer on the phone once a week.
- 3) To speak face to face with the parent / carer once a week.
- 4) To be clear and honest with the group regarding their risky lifestyles surrounding drink, drugs, sex and petty crime.
- 5) To pick up the lads from their homes in a minibus and provide 2 hours 'out and about' on the beach or in the countryside to play football, have a BBQ, go on walks, etc, away from Littlehampton.
- 6) During the February half term in 2005, take the group on a 5 day activity residential in the Brecon Beacons, South Wales.

Our hope is that through friendship, mentoring, support, activities and the residential we see an increase in school attendance and an increase social inclusion. We hope to see reductions in truancy and in school exclusion, and also to see and to see a reduction in theft, criminal damage, arson, joy riding, drug and alcohol consumption. In all of the cases, at some level, we have seen these changes made.

Case 2: Young Parents.

In April 2005 we received £5,200 from West Sussex Primary Care Trust to continue our work with teenage / young parents up to the age of 21. A spokes person for the PCT claimed that, "it is the best piece of work with teenage mums in the whole of the county" when granting us further money in 2006.

The group began in January 2003 with substantial funding from the Body Shop. On our first Tuesday, 2 mums arrived aged 19 and 17 with their babies. The 19 year old was depressed, had been kicked out of home and lived in a basement flat with no natural light able to come in with damp so bad that half the wall (separating the bathroom and the hall) collapsed the week before we moved her out.

Within six months we had 18 mums, 2 dads and 20 children on our books. We were able to 'hold the hand' of the parent and introduce professionals who they might not engage with had we not been around. These professionals included representatives from Education, Health, Benefits and Social Services.

The funding also enabled us to take the group to Fishers Farm, Paulton's Park and for meals to encourage friendship, build trust and give the children an opportunity (for example to spend a day at the farm) that they would not get the chance to visit otherwise.

In April 2005, the group moved to the new facility at the Wickbourne Centre. Here, there are better facilities for the children to enjoy and a coffee shop for the parents to gather at. Numerically the group is so successful it is very difficult to go out on trips as it is not financially viable. As a result, there have been 2 weekends away in Knowles Tooth – an affordable Centre / retreat in Hurstpeirpoint near Brighton.

In March 2006 our numbers for the group reached the highest yet. On our books were 60 parents and children, with a regular attendance of 25. As the parents get towards 21 years of age, and as the children begin to grow towards nursery and / or school, our partnership work with SureStart really becomes crucial for our beneficiaries.

"Glow helps you to feel happy in yourself, especially if you're the kind of person who feels like they want to kill themselves like I do." *Anon, aged 11.*

"Glow gives you good friends so you can stick up for each other if you have people picking on you... you can talk about your feelings". *Amber, aged 11.*

"Thank you for changing my life." *Daniel, aged 15, Denmark.*

"What can I say? I am so grateful. He has had the time of his life!" *Single Mum.* (We were offered a free place on an activity residential, and we recommended her 14 year old son.)

"I don't trust the Police. I don't trust the School. I don't trust the Social. I trust you." *Parent of 15 year old girl on an ASBO.*

"When Breakfast Club closes my children won't have a good start to the day. I can't afford to give them all the fruit and healthy food they need." *Single mum of 5.*

"Out of 10, I give CREW 1 out of 10. But I do like Laser Quest because you get to gun people down. I got regenerated 13 times. I like Jim coz he's good and he's smart. If it wasn't for Crew I'd be playing on my Xbox, which is better. Jon is a crazy driver." *Jared, Monday A CREW aged 10.* (I think he was joking when he gave CREW 1/10)

"She loves Art Attack. She loves Dance. She loves Louisa. You are good people, really good people." *Single Dad of 11 year old girl.*

"When I was going through my separation if it wasn't for the WIRE team and the support you (Al) gave me I wouldn't of coped and probably my kids would be in care now." *Mum with 3 children all aged under 8 after husband walked out.*

"I am new to Littlehampton and I am amazed at the stuff that goes on here for children and families. The WIRE for such a small team is dedicated, professional, fun and an inspiration to the community." *New parent.*

Nadine: (On Crew) "Taking the children out and about is a very simple but effective method to develop their social skills."

Katrine: (On Flora Breakfast) "The club is very well structured and the children are used to the routine."

Sarah: "I will take back energy and love and power and strength for kids in Switzerland. I learned all this here."

Sarah: (On Dance Fusion) "Good atmosphere, very encouraging for the kids." (On ASSC) "Very creative team!! We made so many good things." (On Glow) "I think it's a good space for these girls to share everything." (On Crew) "An important time for these kids." (On Drug Awareness Course) "Very interesting. Thanks to Mark!!! I learned a lot for myself, I didn't know before."

Matthew: (On FOW) "I have found the placement both challenging and rewarding...I feel far more confident in leading larger groups of children. I have very much enjoyed taking opportunities to be part of a large range of activities."

For example – the aim for Blaze 2 is that the individuals all pay £10 per trip we take them out on. This covers entrance and travel and the staff time is built into the staff hours that week.

(iv) Written Report: Issues and Implications to address in order to achieve the Development Plan.

It is all about our CORE COSTS. This is the emphasis of the next few months. At the time of writing, three posts are at risk. Gemma's post expires in August. As you've already read, she supported, trained and recruited 139 different volunteers in 2005/06. Andrew and Mark's (me) funding currently expires in October.

During the first week of May bids are going to The Body Shop Foundation, Connexions and the Church Urban Fund. With core costs secure long term, we can look to blossom again. With this in mind, the 4 main activities to prioritise are:

- 1) Re-launch Breakfast Club.
- 2) Re-launch After School Study Club.
- 3) Secure the future of Crew.
- 4) Secure the future of Dance Nation.

As Hilary Spencer highlighted in her report, the huge tension we have is the vulnerability of salaries and activities. Often we can only secure funding for an activity, for example Blaze or Young Parents, for a year. At present we have the funding to run both these activities until March 31st 2007, with the difficult situation of having staff member Bex Linford (who runs Blaze and Young Parents) on a contract that runs out on December 31st 2006.

During 2005/06 several key volunteers from St. Edward's School in Oxfordshire helped at the Wire. This relationship began when Louisa Searle, St. Edward's pupil, chose (through the Rank Foundation) to volunteer at the Festival Of Wick in 2004. Three months later she returned with a group of friends to help volunteer at one of our Livewires play schemes. Since then about 25 St. Edward's students have helped at various holiday play schemes including 3 coming to Mexico and one of them paying for a Littlehampton 17 year old to go to Mexico as well!

Matthew Hewitt completed a 2 week placement with us, and Louisa completed a 6 month placement with us, both of them in conjuncture with the Rank Foundation. Our link with St. Edwards has become stronger then ever.

Our overseas volunteers in 2005/06 were all top quality. Katrine from Denmark (3 months), Nadine from Germany (6 months) and Sarah from Switzerland (1 month) all came to learn, serve and get their hands dirty in all our activities! In 2006/07 we have the opportunity to host 10 more Oxford students, the potential of 2 workers coming from Mexico and volunteers from Switzerland and Denmark joining us for various periods of time.

My hope is that long term security can be found for our core costs, salaries for the rest of the team, and then funding for our activities. Our partnerships with other agencies are strong. In a year of transition, cut backs and redundancies we aim that 2006/07 is a period of consolidation,

unity and security with the foundations in place for growth and solid sustainability for the community who access our services.
